### Selectmen's Office

March and April were very busy for the Selectmen's office. Early March was preparations for Town Meeting and finalizing budget projections. Some of the business after Town Meeting has been:

- appointments to ZBA, Recreation & Conservation Commissions, Historic District Commission and Recycling Rep.
- we viewed a presentation made by the "Friends of Temple Mt."
- discussed clean up of dump site on Conservation Commission land
- discussed frozen pipes at the Municipal Building
- agreed to purchase a new York rake for the Highway Dept.
- approved flower box placement by Village Green Committee
- hired a part-time police officer
- discussed a donation of \$10,000 for purchase of an OHRV for the Police Dept. and held a Public Hearing on 4/29/03 for citizen feedback
- voted to clean rugs and replace ceiling tiles damaged by roof leaking at Municipal Bldg.
- heard an update from Tom Walko who is looking into State and Federal funding for the Town Hall repair/renovations
- reviewed an application to add more antennas to the tower on Temple Mt.
- reviewed various requests for tax abatements
- heard several complaints
- signed contract for new fire truck
- started replacing rails on the common project
- perambulated the Greenville/Temple town line and started the New Ipswich/Temple boundary
- attended many, many meetings and training sessions

We are in need of 2 volunteers to serve on the Board of Directors for the Ambulance Service. We are also looking for volunteers to help with the common rail project to paint and/or install rails. If you are interested, please contact the Selectmen's office.

Anyone wishing to participate in the perambulation of town boundaries should contact Selectman Fiske at 878-2743 or email [sfiske1@juno.com](mailto:sfiske1@juno.com) to be added to the call list. Perambulating is weather dependent so notification is very quick when we can go, but anyone is welcome to join us.

Please take the time at some point to stop by the office and check your property tax card for accuracy. If the information is incorrect, please let us know so we may correctly depict your property.

The Selectmen meet the 2nd and 4th Tuesdays of each month, meetings are open to the public. All minutes for Selectmen's meetings are available at the Municipal Building and the Library.

### Trustees of Trust Funds

Scholarships are available to Temple high school seniors going onto college or post-secondary education from the Bicentennial Scholarship Fund. Scholarship applications are available from Ben Tirey at 878-2743/P.O. Box 174 and are to be submitted to the Trustees of the Trust Funds by May 20. Scholarships are awarded in June and are paid after successful completion of the first semester of college.

## Budget Advisory Committee (BAC) Report

The BAC will hold its meetings at the Town Hall beginning May 14, 2003, from 7:00 pm to 9:00 pm so that we have plenty of room to meet with taxpayers and hear ideas, concerns, and questions. We want to encourage everyone to get involved in learning and assisting in the budget process. The newly elected BAC really needs taxpayer input and knowledge to best serve the Town (see our mission below). Please attend our meetings and get educated with us. We roll up our sleeves every 2nd and 4th Wednesday of the month. Our minutes are on file at the Library and any of its members can keep you posted on what the committee is doing and the issues facing it.

A little background on the BAC: This past March, voters elected Steve Andersen and Brian Kullgren for a 3 year term, Charlene Eddy and Rae Barnhisel for a 2 year term, and Paul Quinn and Chris Nolte for a 1 year term. At their first meeting, members voted Steve as chair, Brian as vice-chair, and Rae as minute-taker. Steve and Rae were 2 of 6 people appointed by the selectmen to serve on the BAC in 2002 (its first year) and were voted co-chair and minute-taker, respectively, by last year's appointed committee.

We have established a mission to accomplish the following:

Assist the Select Board in preparing the budget;

Promote sound fiscal policy within departments based on frugality, common sense, and well-being;

Standardize the budget process across departments;

Establish and implement an annual budget preparation schedule based on statutory deadlines and prior experience;

Investigate and evaluate ways to save the taxpayer money;

Inform and educate the public on the budget process and be able to provide detailed information on the expenditure of town monies; and

Advocate change in existing budgeting procedures as necessary.

Recently, following lengthy discussion, the BAC forwarded a letter to the selectmen expressing its unanimous opposition to accepting the recent offer of \$10,000 for the purchase of an ATV (four-wheeler), which would be assigned to the Police Department.

The BAC feels strongly that, although the proposed gift is generous, it might entail significant hidden costs (insurance, maintenance, registration, training, etc.) and probable future expenses not included in the donation-and not appropriated by voters. It might expose the Town to possible liability in the case of pursuit-related accidents and would certainly create a new layer of enforcement-one that would need to be funded by future tax dollars.

We would like to see this particular decision voted upon by the taxpayer at the next town meeting to give everyone time to fully study the financial and policy-related consequences of accepting such a gift.

#### Highway Department

Spring has sprung, the mud is starting to dry up, and many of the potholes that we keep filling in are disappearing. Very soon now I will be able to start cleaning the ditches and properly grade the gravel roads. Please proceed with caution when driving through a work area. It is not our policy to use traffic police on all our projects, so we depend on your help and consideration to get you through our work area's safely.

The roads and intersections are being swept clean of all the winter sand. We used approximately 4500 tons of sand on the roads this winter but most of it is used on the gravel roads so the paved roads clean up fairly easily but the intersections are quite a chore.

All of the winter equipment is being cleaned, painted and put away for the summer. Let's hope it doesn't snow anymore.

We have just about finished raking the cemeteries but are looking forward to lot's of help with the ballpark and town common on town clean up day (May 3, 8:30 a.m. Friendship Hall). The snow came so early last fall that very little cleaning got done, which means there is a lot more to do this spring. Hope to see you there!

### Good Roads Day

Our traditional community spring clean-up effort, Good Roads Day, is re-scheduled for May 3rd. ### Conservation Commission

The Temple Conservation Commission has had a busy start to the new year with several major projects already underway. Under the Chairmanship of Paul Quinn, the group is meeting every two weeks with subcommittees working key issues in the interim. The group has also adopted a policy of inviting external speakers once a month to address conservation related topics of importance to townspeople. The Town's signboard and this newsletter will be used to advertise dates and topics.

Recent outside speakers and their topics included:

Temple Mountain - Will Fenno from the Friends of Temple Mountain group gave a presentation on the project well underway to protect this important piece of land

Keeping Temple Green and Farm Friendly - Gail MacWilliams from the NH Coalition for Sustainable Agriculture discussed the importance of open space and agriculture to NH communities.

Future topics are expected to include:

A representative from the NH Dept. of Environmental Services will speak on working with the State's environmental laws.

Steve Walker from the Land and Community Heritage Investment program (LCHIP) will speak on the stewardship of existing protected land in Temple.

One project now underway is the establishment of a detailed policy on appropriate uses of the Town's Conservation Fund and the identification and prioritization of land conservation projects that the monies should be used for. The Commission will be discussing these topics in their open meetings and invites public attendance and participation. A special meeting is also planned to formally gather input from townspeople.

The next meeting of the Commission will be on May 12th at 7:00 p.m. in Friendship Hall. All townspeople are invited and encouraged to attend. ## Fire Warden

The snow is gone and written burning permits are required for all open burning. Burn barrels and incinerators are now banned by State Law. There is no open burning allowed between the hours of 9:00 a.m. and 5:00 p.m., also a State Law. Until things green up few permits will be issued.

Permits can be obtained from Fire Warden Joe Cournoyer 878-1479. Remember fires are not to be left unattended and must be completely out when leaving them.

Commercial permits may be obtained from the Forest Ranger for business purposes.

To obtain a permit you must be 18 years old and burn on your own property.

The TVFD is fundraising for a Thermal imager. This amazing technology that allows firefighters to see through smoke has proven itself as an invaluable lifesaving tool. Thermal imagers have many uses in the emergency services.

Quickly search a smoke filled room for an unconscious victim, or a scared child hiding under a bed or in a closet.

Safely find the seat of a fire from the outside of a building without risking fire fighters lives.

Find hot spots on a chimney fire, underground brush fire, electrical fires and partition fires.

Help locate lost persons in the woods by following the heat of recent footsteps.

More uses of this tool are being found every day

Small hand held thermal imagers have recently hit the market priced under \$15000. If you would like to help, please send a donation to the TVFD Firefighters Fund. Neighbors have already donated over \$2200 to this project.

## Master Plan Public Workshops May 21 and June 18

The Temple Planning Board is scheduling two public workshops to get input on Temple's updated Master Plan, specifically its Future Land Use Plan. The dates are Wednesday May 21 and Wednesday June 18 (both the 3rd Wednesday of the month). Workshops will begin at 7:30 pm in the Town Hall. There will be refreshments and good cheer.

Additional public workshops may be scheduled, however, these two will be attended by Southwest Regional Planning Commission (the entity we are paying to help us). Its staff will faithfully record public opinion in order to demonstrate that there has been citizen input when Planning Board members vote on the Master Plan in Fall 2003. Note that these are not public hearings (those will be scheduled for Fall and may not allow much input into the Plan at that late date).

These upcoming workshops will specifically provide the Goals and Objectives for future land use in Temple and will reflect the ideas and comments of all present. These are two great opportunities to offer input, think along with diverse viewpoints, and help build consensus on what we all think should happen to Temple in the next 5 to 15 years. Ideally, a town's Master Plan should define the quality of life for current residents and seek ways to maintain that quality for future residents.

Everyone will be able to see the draft Basic Studies portion of the Master Plan ("where Temple is now") and receive or arrange for copies at the workshops. Thanks to everyone who helped Planning Board members make this portion as current and comprehensive as it is. However, this next portion, the Future Land Use Plan ("where Temple wants to be") is even more critical. It absolutely depends on citizen input. Please pass the word. Please come!

## Memorial Day 2003 Slated for June 1

Plans are moving forward for Temple's annual Memorial Day observance, which this year falls on June 1, the first Sunday after the national holiday. In keeping with long-standing tradition, the parade will step off at noon, after church gets out, with various elements of the parade marshaling at "The Old School," now the residence of the Robert Moses family. All military veterans--newcomers and old hands alike--are encouraged to march in the parade ("Civvies" are perfectly fine if your uniform has shrunk over the years; bring your old service cap if you've got it.) Riflemen for the town's honor guard are always in demand (uniform, at least semi-regulation, required).

Services are scheduled at the Memorial Tree, where honors will be rendered to Temple's three servicemen who lost their lives in World War II. Beginning this year, 2003, plans are being readied to make special, individual note of the 60th anniversary of each of these men's ultimate sacrifices, in the order in which they were taken from us: 2003, 1st Sgt. David H. Quinn (1943), USMC; Gunner's Mate 3rd Class Leon Blood (1944), U.S. Navy; and 1st Lt. Murray M. Day (1945), U.S. Army. Only a handful of folks reading this item will personally remember these brave men, which somehow makes it all the more important that they not be forgotten, not only as fallen warriors, but also as fellow citizens who once had bright plans for a good life, right here in their hometown.

Following the Memorial Tree services, a brief ceremony will be held across the way on the Common, as will a similar observance at the New Miller Cemetery, by the ballfield.

The Greenville Legion post will once again assist us this year with its Memorial Day services, providing its well-trained, award-winning honor guard, which, in addition to rendering honors in the center of town and at the Old Miller Cemetery, will also travel cross-town to the cemetery in the North End, to honor the veterans buried there.
