Hillsborough County Conservation

Milford - The Hillsborough County Conservation District and USDA Natural Resources Conservation Service are sponsoring a FREE listening session for anyone interested in finding out more about another option for placing land in an easement. If you currently own at least 10 contiguous acres of farm or ranch land, have no more than 50% forest cover on your property, and would like to protect your land from future development, you should attend this session. Landowners, Conservation Commission members, Planning Board members, Regional Planning Commissions, Land Trusts and any additional area conservation groups are all encouraged to attend.

The Farm and Ranchlands Protection Program (FRPP) was established in 1996 to partner with state and local units of government, non-profit organizations and others to purchase conservation easements on farm and ranch land. The primary purpose of a FRPP easement is to protect agricultural land and important prime soils from development. According to NRCS, "since the program's establishment, NH has received almost \$8 million in funding to permanently protect 4,463 acres of agricultural land. In 2005, NH received \$2.68 million to award to some of the top ranking farms."

Steve Hundley, FRPP Program Manager, will be presenting at the session where individuals can learn about the purpose of the program, eligibility criteria, the application process, and the likelihood of funding. The workshop will be held on Monday, November 14th from 6:00 PM - 8:00 PM at the Chappell Professional Center in Milford. While there is no fee to attend, pre-registration is required. Conservation Commission

Monthly Walks -The September walk explored the new loop trail at the Town Forest. This trail is well-marked and there are trail maps available at the starting place on North Road just before the Lyndeborough town line. In October, 40 mile-an-hour winds and very wet trails made it necessary to shorten the Temple Mountain outing to the top of the old ski trails. The view was great, including mountains in several directions and Boston skyscrapers.
