Temple Volunteer Fire Department

Rescue Van Refurb- Rescue Rosie is "under the knife" receiving a full refurbishment that should bring her into National Fire Protection Compliance. The engine has been replaced, the transmission and rear end rebuilt. New seating has been installed over a new rubber nonskid floor. Rosie's interior already looks great but she still has a long way to go. Improvements will include air-pack filling station, auxiliary heater, exterior compartments and a "rear view" camera. The TVFD thanks Steve Anderson for his creativity, enthusiasm and care he has given to make this such a fun project.

A few safety reminders as heating season approaches-

- Clean your chimney and stove pipes!
- If you have a fireplace stove insert clean the smoke chamber damper adapter. Debris buildups have caused the worst chimney fires we have ever seen.
- Check your smoke detectors, change the batteries then dust or vacuum the unit.
- Inspect your fire extinguishers. Turn them over and gently hit them with an open hand or rubber mallet to loosen the dry chemical. Make sure the needle reads "charged".
- Have a home fire escape plan and practice a family fire drill.
- Hug a firefighter.

The TVFD is always looking for more volunteers. Extricating a trapped driver may take only minutes, extinguishing a two alarm fire may take only an hour, the resulting sore back and bruises may heal in days but the experience of saving life and property will last as part of you forever!

Selectmen's Report

With year end approaching the Board of Selectmen have been busy finalizing the 2006 tax rate that will include some changes in our accounting procedures and Temple's allocation of ConVal costs. We expect the State's review and approval of that rate within the next few weeks. Thanks to the good groundwork laid by both the Budget Advisory and the Capital Improvement Committees and the Town department heads, we will be working on the final budgets for 2007 in the coming weeks and will be scheduling a public hearing on February 16, 2007.

In preparation for Town Meeting and voting in March, please be advised that petitions to amend zoning or historic district ordinances or the Town's building code must be submitted between November 13 and December 13, 2006. February 6, 2007 is the last day a warrant article can be added by petition.

Selectmen have been meeting with the Friends of Temple Town Hall and the State's Division of Historic Resources to finalize the plans for the completion of the addition and to commence the restoration of the main hall. The Town has also accepted with gratitude the Friends gift of the restoration of the windows; this work will start in January and is expected to take approximately two months.

The State has adopted new rules regarding junk yards that Temple will be requiring compliance with effective January 1, 2007. The former Tyler property on Cutter Road has now been cleaned up and we are awaiting word from the State's Department of Environmental Services regarding any additional testing that they may require.

The Town's 250th anniversary is fast approaching and the Planning Committee is being formed. Please contact Sherry Fiske if you would be interested in serving on this very exciting Committee.

Select Board meetings are held on the second and fourth Tuesdays of every month at 7:00 PM at the Municipal Building. Our preliminary agendas are posted on the Town web site on the Friday preceding each meeting and the public is always invited to attend.

Protecting Temple's Natural Areas - The Commission is continuing to work with landowners and developers to protect Temple's most important natural areas. While that work includes protecting habitat for wildlife and

our Town's general rural character, we are also commencing a study of our long-term water resources. Having a large portion of our land in mountainous terrain and with limited streams, ponds and wetlands, we need to understand what the long-term implications for our water supply are.

This study is an extension of the Natural Resources Inventory work that the Commission completed this year and which is now an integral part of the Temple Master Plan. This water resources study is being undertaken in conjunction with our Health Officer Peter Caswell and will include input from other professionals in the field. A general planning and educational meeting is being planned which will be announced on the Town's website and the Con Com listserve.

Friends of the Temple Town Hall

On October 10, the Select Board voted to accept the FTTH's gift of 12 restored windows for the Town Hall. Heartwood Building and Restoration of Hawley, Mass., which restored the windows of the Jaffrey Meeting House, among others in the area, will do the restoration work. Given that the Town Hall will be used by the Congregational Church and other town organizations during the month of December, the start of the restoration work will be postponed until January. The antique windows will be restored at the company work site in Mass.; however, the storm windows will remain in place during the restoration process. We are learning what it means to "play the waiting game" as the Select Board, the FTTH, and the town at large wait patiently (!) for the HUD grant funds. Yes, bureaucratic wheels do indeed turn slowly, but one of these days hammers and saws will be heard again in the Town Hall as workers labor to complete the next phase of the rehabilitation plan, as agreed on the by Select Board. Townspeople can look forward to seeing a completed Town Hall addition, a quiet, new heating system and work continuing on the heart of the project, the historic hall itself. As always, your support for this project, which promises to benefit us all, is much appreciated. If you wish to make a tax-deductible donation to the Town Hall restoration fund before the end of the year, you can do so by mailing your check to the Friends of Temple Town Hall, Box 28, Temple.

Hillsborough County Conservation

Milford - Hillsborough County will be awarding funds to local landowners under the federal USDA EQIP (Environmental Quality Incentives Program) and USDA WHIP (Wildlife Habitat Incentives Program). EQIP, first established in the 1996 Farm Bill, is a voluntary incentives-based conservation program for farmers and landowners. Through EQIP, the Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS) provides technical and financial assistance to address conservation concerns involving farmsteads, cropland health, grazing land, forestland and water conservation. Applicants are required to meet certain federal eligibility requirements and should be engaged in livestock, forest products, or agricultural production. Cost-share is available up to 75 percent for installing conservation practices, and limited resource producers and beginning farmers may be eligible for up to 90 percent. Practices include erosion and sediment control on farm and forest access roads, waste storage facilities, pesticide containment, nutrient and pest management, livestock fencing and irrigation systems, to name a few.

WHIP provides incentives to develop fish and wildlife habitat. Participants agree to implement a wildlife habitat plan and the USDA provides cost-share assistance for the implementation of wildlife practices on declining habitats.

Applications are being accepted through the Hillsborough County Conservation District and NRCS Milford field office. While applications are accepted year-round, they should be submitted by October 13th to be considered for funding. All required eligibility paperwork must be completed by November 13th in order to compete for fiscal year 2007 funds. Applications are ranked based on their environmental benefit, and further compete for statewide funding.
